## Lack of Awareness + Cultural Stigma = A Brain Injury Public Health Challenge in Northern Virginia



As many as **3 million people** in America experience some type of brain injury every year. Injuries occur on average every 23 seconds. But according to a new poll of Northern Virginians:

43% say they would not know or are not sure they know how to protect themselves or a loved one after a concussion, traumatic brain injury or stroke.



62% say there are negative perceptions and stigma attached to people with brain injuries.

67% say that sports culture has made it acceptable to ignore a concussion to be able to get back on the field.

believe that most health insurers will pay for ongoing treatments and therapies after a brain injury is diagnosed.



do not know there are free services available in Northern Virginia when a person does need help after a brain injury.
